Important note: cancellation of meeting

The Convener has decided to cancel the meeting scheduled for Monday 23 October in Stirling. This is because the only items suitable for taking on that day were consideration of a petition and consideration of a draft report on the Protection of Wild Mammals (Scotland) Bill. Neither need be dealt with that week (the Rural Affairs Committee timescale for Stage 1 having now been extended until December) and they would not have justified holding a meeting, particularly given the additional cost and travelling time involved for members and staff. EXPLANATORY NOTE ON SR2000 INCREASES

The Comprehensive Spending Review in 1998 set the baseline provision for 1999-2000, 2000-2001 and 2001-02. When the Scottish Parliament was established, the Scottish Executive carried out a budgetary review and the baselines were revised, although this was mainly a moving around provision within the overall total of the Scottish Executive Budget, not new money. Additional funds came to the Scottish Executive as a result of the Chancellor's budget speech earlier this year, although in the main these were for the current year only.

SR2000 was the next major spending review. The budgetary announcements now being made deal with how the additional spending that came to the Scottish Executive in formula consequentials is being allocated to the individual services.

SR2000 additions were made over three years -2001-02, 2002-03 and 2003-04 - and the baselines increased accordingly. Additional provision is made for each year, and the total of these additions is usually announced as a headline figure over the three-year period. As an example:

Say a baseline has £10m in the current year. Under SR2000, this baseline receives additional funding of £2m in year 1, £3m in year 2 and £4m in year 3. Total increases over the three year period is therefore £9m. The baseline then becomes £12m in year 1, £13m in year 2 and £14m in year 3. The overall increase over the three-year period is still £9m, but the increase for year 3 over the current year is £4m. To simply announce a £4m increase loses sight of the additional funding granted in years 1 and 2.

Headline increase announcements are always followed by individual year increase information. Percentage change information is calculated on the difference between the third year in the survey and the current year – for example in Justice for Fire Central Government the baseline provision for 2003-04 is £6.4m and current year's baseline is £3.8m. Cash terms percentage increase is therefore £6.4m - £3.8m = £2.6m, expressed as a percentage of the current year = 68.4%.

There is therefore no element of double or triple counting.

Note by the Executive on resource accounting and budgeting

Key points

- Resource Accounting and Budgeting (RAB) applies practices of rest of economy to central government.
 - Accruals accounting for public spending matches payments and receipts to time period incurred rather than when paid.
 - Recognises non-cash costs of government activity e.g. capital consumption (depreciation), and opportunity cost of investment in assets (cost of capital)
- Expands mainstream practice to reflect nature of Parliamentary control and need to focus on departmental outputs.
 - Departments required to:
 set objectives;
 report on how resources are allocated to these objectives; and report what is achieved as a result.
- Present system of accounting is cash based. Departments plan and account for cash as it passes through their books, irrespective of what it is spent on or when the items purchased will be used.
- Main differences
 - Timing of recognising payments and receipts
 - Capital Charges (Depreciation and Cost of Capital)
 - Public corporations measure total public spending effect rather than external finance or grants received.

Benefits of RAB

- ensure full economic cost of government activity is measured properly.
 It will include non-cash costs e.g. the consumption of capital assets, and will match costs to the correct time period.
- improve treatment of capital spending.
 - The cost and consumption of capital will be spread over its useful life. This will remove the initial bias against capital spending and ensure capital is managed correctly once purchased.
- require departments to report systematically on how their resources are allocated to their objectives, and what this achieved.
 - This will improve transparency for the taxpayer. It will also improve the process of deciding where to allocate resources to best effect

Drug misuse targets: request for committee feedback

Note by the Convener

I attach a letter from the Scottish Executive Health Department and associated material. As you will see, this was sent to the Clerk to this Committee and to the clerks to three other committees with an interest in this topic.

The letter makes clear that the Minister, Angus MacKay, is seeking the views of "the relevant parliamentary committees". However, the timescale for feedback does not easily allow this committee, or any of the other committees concerned, time to formulate a considered response. For this reason, the letter invites individual members to respond direct to the official named at the bottom of the letter.

The draft targets attached to the letter are the product of some months of consultation and discussion by individuals informed in this multi-disciplinary area. I do not see how this Committee could offer a worthwhile input into this process without devoting a substantial amount of work to it, which would be likely to involve either evidence-taking or fact-finding visits. Given the recess, and the Committee's other ongoing priorities, I do not believe this is practicable within the timescale set (which, the clerk has established, is not flexible).

I am therefore asking the Clerk to circulate this material to members primarily for information only. Any member is, of course, free to take up the offer to comment on an individual basis. To avoid any uncertainty, I think it would be helpful if any member doing so makes clear in his or her response that it does not represent the view of the Committee as a whole.
